These history reports can be requested from our IT support. There is also the potential to have an "information sharing agreement" with the police by where they can then share the registered manager if there are any persons within the local area who would pose a risk to the young people, this agreement would need to be signed and agreed by an Inspector at Durranhill and in agreement with the registered manager, and this to-date in not in place.
